

She supports the SSPI's Digital Divide Taskforce, working with internal and external constituents, technology companies, and major internet providers throughout the state to close technology gaps impacting students and educators. Prior to her appointment as Chief Deputy, Mary worked at the CDE as the SSPI's Senior Advisor since 2019. Before joining CDE, she served as Chief of Staff and District Director to then-Assembly Member Thurmond, representing California's 15th Assembly District.

As an innovative entrepreneur with a strong aptitude for technology, Mary Nicely founded her own company and was President and CEO of Nicely Done Solutions, Inc., a custom database development company headquartered in Berkeley, California, for 16 years. She also worked for Apple Computer for 14 years, serving as the Western U.S. K-12 Service and Support Manager for 7 of those years.

Mary is a first generation Burmese American and proud product of California public schools. She graduated from Monterey Peninsula Community College and U.C. Berkeley with a degree in Political Economy of Industrial Societies. She was Commissioner and Chair of the Public Education Sub-Committee at the City of Berkeley Peace and Justice Commission for 8 years, and she currently serves on the Asian Pacific American Heritage Awards Steering Committee of San Francisco since 2010. From 2010 to 2016, Ms. Nicely was the Emerging Communities Liaison for the White House Initiative on Asian Americans & Pacific Islanders for the San Francisco Bay Area.

She also sits on two boards. The first is <u>Safe Black Space</u>, which empowers Black communities to heal from racism and thrive. The second is the <u>Torlakson Whole</u> <u>Child Institute</u>, which advocates for solutions to support the whole-child in California public schools.

Personal Statement:

Access to arts learning should be embedded in school systems as part of prioritizing access, equity, and well-being. It should not be dependent on whether a small group of adults are in place to make the extra effort to ensure arts are included, or the zip code where a student resides. Arts education must be available to all as part of the core curriculum and schools must design systems to ensure that is a reality."

Carmen Domingo became dean of the College of Science and Engineering in 2019, making her the first women and Latina to serve in the position at SF State. After joining the University as an assistant professor of Biology in 1997, she served

as associate chair of Biology from 2007 to 2015, and was the interim dean in 2017. An expert in vertebrate embryology, she has taught and mentored hundreds of students in the classroom and lab — many of whom have gone on to excellent Ph.D. programs and careers in biomedical sciences. She has been awarded over \$25M in grants from the National Institute of Health, National Science Foundation, California Institute of Regenerative Medicine, and other agencies to support her research activities, student training efforts, and professional development opportunities for faculty. In 2018 she was elected as a California Academy of Sciences fellow.

Domingo earned her Ph.D. in Molecular and Cell Biology from UC Berkeley in 1995. She was a recipient of a UC President's Postdoctoral Fellowship from 1995 to 1997 in the

American sexualities in representation, her books include The Movies of Racial Childhoods (Duke, 2024), The Proximity of Other Skins (Oxford, 2020), Straitjacket Sexualities (Stanford, 2012), and The Hypersexuality of Race (2007) which won Best Book in Cultural Studies from the Association for Asian American Studies which also awarded her the 2022 Excellence in Mentorship Award. She co-edited The Feminist Porn Book (2013) and The Unwatchability of Whiteness (2018). Her peer-reviewed articles appear in top journals in cinema, performance, ethnic, feminist, sexuality studies, and transnational popular culture. Her writings are translated to French, German, Italian, Portuguese and Spanish. Her recent films, The Celine Archive (2020) and 80 Years Later: On Japanese American Racial Inheritance (2022) each won several festival awards and are distributed by Women Make Movies. She received her Ph.D. in Modern Thought and Literature from Stanford University, her M.F.A. in Film Directing and Production from UCLA School of Theater, Film and Television and her B.A. in Ethnic Studies from U.C. Berkeley.
