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## SENATOR PRICE'S ADVANCE SCREENING OF "THUNDER SOUL" DRAWS POSITIVE RESPONSE FROM INFLUENTIAL VOICES IN THE ARTS

Los Angeles, CA- Senator Curren D. Price, Jr. co-hosted an advance screening of the documentary, "Thunder Soul" at the Museum of Tolerance in Los Angeles, on Tuesday evening.
